### **Seeing the Wood for the Trees**

You must have had that weird experience of casually thinking about an apparently uncommon item and then, over the next few days, having examples unexpectedly appear on a few occasions. A friend recently recounted their experience of this when choosing a new car. As they had rather special requirements for both business and family use, they drew up a detailed list of specific features their new car must have. Using the internet they identified a specific make and model as their ideal vehicle. This is when the weird stuff began! Having this exemplar in mind they began to spot such vehicles on a surprisingly regular basis as they went about their normal routine over the following few days. They realised this was not because these particular cars had suddenly appeared in their neighbourhood. These cars had been there all the time. However, what they had previously seen but not noticed was now attracting their attention.

Scientists can trace this phenomenon to the Reticular Activating System, a pencil shaped area of the brain, that acts as a filter cutting down the unnecessary "background" noise of information so that the brain can prioritise and work more efficiently under challenging pressures. What was previously dismissed as irrelevant was, nevertheless, there all the while!

By the time you are reading this article the Coronavirus (Covid-19) pandemic will have progressed and may well have exerted unparalleled



effects on the health of individuals and the fabric of our society. As I write this late in the evening of St. Patrick's Day, I am reflecting on a day when unprecedented formal advice has been issued that church services should "cease until further notice". Indeed, these last few days I have spent an inordinate amount of time involved in cancelling, rescheduling or contingency planning for the full range of church organisations and activities, schools, community groups and others. In an atmosphere of uncertainty and, when a plethora of information produces confusion, it is perhaps not surprising that we have witnessed unedifying episodes of panic buying and stockpiling.

There is no doubt that this ordeal will test us. How will our community emerge? How will we as God's people emerge? Will our society's Reticular Activating System be so recalibrated that we will see things differently? Will we filter out what we come to realise is non-essential and bring into sharper focus what really matters in our relationships with one another, with our community, with our God and His creation?

Even though a microscopic virus has humbled the superpowers we humans can rightly claim to be a creative force. On 6<sup>th</sup> August 1991 the first website went live at CERN (the European Organisation for Nuclear Research) in Switzerland. Today there are 1.5 billion websites, even though less than 200 million are active. Is that not incredible ingenuity?

On the other hand, we humans can be spectacularly careless and abusive. We live in a world where fresh water, on which we all depend for survival, covers less than 1% of our planet but provides habitat for 10% of the world's species. Demand for this lifegiving and life-sustaining resource is predicted to increase by 50% by 2050. But what have we done? Since 1970 in the UK there has been an 83% decline in our freshwater species of fish.

Just a few rather random statistics — and yet indicative of a disdainful neglect of our relationship with the world we have been called to care for. We are inclined to think that real sin comes at the hands of murders, robbers, cheats and bullies. However, this is also what sin looks like — our environment ravaged and destroyed.

Without resorting to facile histrionics I do want to suggest that we are living at a defining time for our generation. As this year began we knew we were facing the immediate challenge of Brexit and the longer-term threat of the climate crisis — but who saw Covid-19 coming? So what is our response? Standing up in faith or cowering in fear and faithlessness?

May this be the time when we see things differently, when we open our eyes to the awesome call and invitation of God to walk humbly, respectfully, intelligently and creatively with Him as stewards, not destroyers, of His creation.

The prophet Jeremiah was addressing the people who had it all – the Law, the teaching of the prophets and their history and heritage filled with God's miracles of guidance and deliverance. But they had a choice to make. What sort of tree would they be?

### Jeremiah 17.7-8

7 Blessed are those who trust in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord.
8 They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream.
It shall not fear when heat comes, and its leaves shall stay green; in the year of drought it is not anxious, and it does not cease to bear fruit.



The prophet points to trees as an example for us to follow so that when difficulty comes, we, like them, can hold fast to life. Trees do so much to support the world around them. They absorb carbon from the atmosphere. They hold back storms and flooding. They protect the soil and restore moisture to it. They provide habitats for wildlife.

Will this prove to be the year when, trusting and rooted in God, we in First Larne can flourish as one of the restorers of life to our community?

The heat has come. Are we withered or sturdy? Are we fearful or abundant fruit bearers?

There are three easy steps that will allow you to be part of it



### NEW WAYS OF REPORTING WHAT GOES ON IN FIRST LARNE

Protection Regulations (GDPR) either in work or Ulster to probably over 200,000 listeners. maybe in letters from our banks. In response to these legislative changes and, taking guidance from PCI and the Charities Commission, our Kirk Session have decide to make some changes in the way the information in our Annual Report is made available to the congregation.

### **Congregational Committee Report for 2019**

We thank God for the devoted service of the members of the church Committee and pray that their continued involvement will be rewarding both for them and for the church.

FINANCE: Our Treasury Team was led by Jenny McKay with assistance from Joan Arnold, Glynis and Robin Alexander. Jenny, Joan and Glynis stepped down at the end of December 2019. We thank each one for their hard work and dedication. We look forward to the involvement of the new Treasury Team members, Eamonn McFerran, Treasurer, Shirley Torbitt, Assistant Treasurer, with Judith Evans and Elaine Magee and thank them for their commitment and dedication.

Our **General account** income was more than £14,664 less than our everyday expenditure during 2019. Our congregation are thanked once again for their faithful giving. However despite the best efforts of our Treasury team we finish the year with a deficit. Our projected budget reflects the increased costs of running our large complex and maintaining the property as well as continuing our outreach into our local community. To meet these expenses your increased generosity will be needed in 2020.



Our 2019 giving by monthly envelope and standing order together with Gift Aid did not reach our target of honour of £19 236. We will have a deficit of £1,438.06. Could you help us to

reach our target in 2020 with a modest increase in your giving?

Our **Maintenance Account** giving by monthly envelope and standing order together with Gift Aid has allowed much important work maintaining and developing our complex to be completed. Despite some unexpected expenses during the year the healthy balance in this account should allow completion of some work already planned for 2020.

Our **Finance** working groups include Treasury team, Gift Aid and Counting team. These groups supervise the counting of all money collected, the claiming of Gift Aid where available and the allocation of money to our different accounts. We encourage all members to pay by Standing Order which helps with budgeting and to sign a Gift Aid claim form.

**PROPERTY:** Property Committee looks after the maintenance and upkeep of our buildings and property including our Manse and Ilse Court dwelling. We thank Stephen Ross for his hard work leading the Property Team and also our Development working group, and we assure him of our prayers and continued support as he undertakes these demanding roles.

Maintenance Team: The late Robert Baillie, John Millar, Bertie Wilson and helpers work most weekday mornings maintaining and repairing our complex as well as installing new equipment. We are very grateful for their hard work and expertise which saves our church a lot of money! Following the death of Robert Baillie, the Maintenance team have continued to complete work around the complex, but his knowledge and abilities are sadly missed. We thank all the team members who work hard to keep the many aspects of a busy church running smoothly.

#### STAFF

We are blessed with our staff and ministry team led by Rev Dr Colin McClure with Pastoral Associate Rev Maynard Cathcart all of whom work hard to allow our congregation to worship and serve God well together. We are grateful to Sheila Doran our Church Administrator, William Rainey our Caretaker, Amy Hunter our Co-ordinator of Youth and Family Ministry, Jax McCallum our Community Support Worker and Dr. Stephen Reid who leads our music, ably assisted when required by Derick Jenkins and Norman Carmichael.

## Passing it on - Scripture Union in our Schools



Rebekah and I are Scripture Union NI's E3 Schools' Workers for East Antrim, which covers, Carrickfergus, Larne and Ballyclare. The three main aims of the 'E3 Project' are to engage with children and young people through RE lessons, assemblies and SU groups, to equip Christian staff

and pupils to be salt and light in their schools and to empower churches to get involved in their local schools.

We are part of a wider movement that is not only focused on Schools' Ministry but is also made up of three other departments — Administration, Camps and Missions and Training and Resources. Across all of these departments, our overriding aim is to make God's Good News known to children, young people and families so that they will meet with Him daily through his Word, and eventually enter into a personal relationship with Him. Everything we do is rooted in Scripture, and we keep coming back to the verses that are written in Psalm 78:1-7.

O my people, listen to my instructions. Open your ears to what I am saying, for I will speak to you in a parable. I will teach you hidden lessons from our past— stories we have heard and known, stories our ancestors handed down to us. We will not hide these truths from our children; we will tell the next generation about the glorious deeds of the Lord, about his power and his mighty wonders. For he issued his laws to Jacob; he gave his instructions to Israel. He commanded our ancestors to teach them to their children, so the next generation might know them— even the children not yet born— and they in turn will teach their own children. So each generation should set its hope anew on God, not forgetting his glorious miracles and obeying his commands."

We at Scripture Union love children. We love engaging with them, walking alongside them and telling them that God loves them. Children are important to us, because children are important to God. The opening verses of Psalm 78 stress the

It is important that we teach our children when they are still young. The formative years of a child's life are critically important for their spiritual development. And that spiritual development takes place largely in the family and in the church. But what if children are not exposed to spiritual things at home? What if they are not brought to church? In order to engage with children, we need to be where they are. They don't have to come to church, but they do have to go to school.

Parents and grandparents have a responsibility to teach their children, to provide them with knowledge to help their development. But we all have a responsibility to tell the next generation about the 'glorious deeds of the Lord'. We must go and tell - we must seek them out. This is why, for us as SU, school's ministry is so important. In order to reach children and young people, to tell them about God, we must be where they are.

Children have the opportunity every day to learn and grow in subjects like literacy, mathematics and science. While these are important, we believe that learning about God and Jesus, about the church and Christian beliefs are of equal importance. We want there to be a space in the classroom for children and young people to open God's Word for themselves, to ask difficult questions and to explore faith. We have opportunities daily to engage with children and young people, and the reality is that some of them have never heard about God before — some of them have never even opened a Bible before. What a huge privilege and responsibility it is to introduce them to a God who sent His Son to die for them.

We deliver a series of lessons every year to P5s across the district about the miracles of Jesus. The first lesson is on the feeding of the five thousand, and it is humbling to see the reactions of children who are hearing the story for the very first time. Their eyes widen, their mouths open and they are just amazed at how Jesus was able to feed so many people with one packed lunch!

share with children God's mighty deeds that are recorded in the Bible; to share with them about men and women whom God has used mightily throughout history; to share with them personal stories of how God has answered prayer in our own lives. We need to let them see the impact God has on our faith in everyday struggles and trials. Most of all, share with them what God has done through the sending of his Son Jesus to bring us salvation. Yet Rebekah Ravey: how can we do that if we're not there?

### MODERATOR'S PRAYER WEEK

If you missed it, here's a little taster....

PSALM 46:1-3 "God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth give way and the mountains fall into the heart of sea, though its waters roar and foam and the mountains quake with their surging."

In the midst of suffering how can we enjoy God's peace? Troubles may come in the form of physical illness, persecution at work, grief, depression, anxious thoughts, disappointment, betrayal or a breakdown in a relationship. Our peace can be • shattered.

We need to take heart from Psalm 46 that God is our refuge and strength as we live in a fallen world. We do not need to fear as we rest in the arms of a loving God who can give us a deep, unshakeable peace even in difficult seasons. There is a God who is above us, who is above everything but is also always with us. It is He who brings us through trials for reasons known only to Him. God knows exactly what

He is doing and is using our trials to transform us during the fierce storms we endure.

### Pray for:

- a person you know who is struggling to be content. Ask God to enable them to trust him and to find in him a peace that passes understanding.
- your church that it might so embody the peace of God, that it would act like a magnet drawing in those on the periphery of your congregation and arousing their interest so that they might in turn experience this peace themselves.
- for believers to become agents of peace in a society where sectarianism is all too prevalent and where difference of any sort is viewed with suspicion.
- your work context, school or wherever you spend a good part of your day - that you might be a peacemaker and point to Jesus through your actions.

## A postcard from the Holy Land

Our recent trip to the Holy Land was part holiday, part pilgrimage and part history lesson. We were warmly welcomed at a Palestinian Arab run hotel in Jerusalem



and at a Jewish run hotel on the shore of Lake Galilee. History is ever present in Israel, as we discovered during our harrowing visit to the Yad Vashem Holocaust memorial, where the suffering of the Jewish people in the 20<sup>th</sup> century was graphically portrayed. Hence the security presence – but for the older members of the Group it brought back memories of our own Troubles. Still, the apartheid security wall topped by razor wire and a remote controlled machine gun were more than a little sinister.

We met children and carers from the Palestinian community at the Jeel al-Amal Boy's Home and school in Bethlehem, funded in part by the McCabe Trust. We were also hosted by the Bethlehem Rehabilitation Centre hearing of their work with injured members of the Palestinian community prevented by the Israeli military from accessing specialist medical services in Jerusalem just 5 miles away.

We were able to walk in Jesus' footsteps from the Mount of Olives toward Jerusalem and along the Via Dolorosa. We enjoyed the peace and quiet of the Garden Tomb as we remembered Jesus' death and resurrection. We attended a part English, part Arabic church service in Jerusalem and shared in bible readings and the Lord's supper at key points on our pilgrimage journey.

Outside Jerusalem we floated in the Dead Sea and visited Masada fortress. In Galilee we learned from "Martha, Abraham and Sarah" about Jesus' life growing up in Nazareth village and crossed the Sea of Galilee in a small boat just like the disciples 2000 years ago.





# Let's talk about toilets!

immediately turn-off at the mention of anything to do with poo or toilets. It's just not polite or maybe we are a bit squeamish. But please keep reading.

long since we as a society living on an island, just sight out of mind. And it's easy to make jokes about "going behind a bush" if we are caught out on a day out in the UK or Ireland. But, shockingly, 1 in 3 people across the world don't have somewhere safe to go to the toilet - ever. Bad sanitation is one of the world's biggest killers: it hits women, children, old and sick people hardest. The facts are stark -

- 844 million people lack access to clean safe drinking water
- Around half the people in the world have an illness caused by bad sanitation.
- Every minute, a child under the age of five dies because of dirty water and poor sanitation.

In Africa, half of young girls who drop out of school do so because they need to collect water - often from many miles away - or because the school hasn't got separate toilets for boys and girls. Not having a loo puts people at risk of being bitten by snakes as they squat in the grass and makes women and girls a target for sexual assault as they go to the toilet in the open.

Providing people with clean water and basic sanitation is one of the most cost-effective ways to release people from poverty: for every £1 spent on water and sanitation, more than £5 is returned through saved time, increased productivity and reduced health costs.

Sanitation is serious stuff. Over decades of learning, it's become clear that projects work best when local people see the need for improved sanitation - and make that change happen themselves. It's all about dignity and self-respect. For many communities, hearing about the link between sanitation health is a revelation: a light bulb moment. Hygiene education on practices such as handwashing is key to behaviour change in the long term. Many have never known why diarrhoea is so common, and why their children have fallen ill or died.

Most people in NI, above 5 years old, will Suddenly, they understand. And then they want a latrine - that they build themselves. Because a family who have built their own latrine is much more likely to use it and look after it.

Whilst we may take our loo for granted, it's not that Toilet Twinning is a Tear Fund supported programme which works through local partners to provide health conveniently threw our sewage into the sea - out of education and sanitation. The community decides on the design and materials to be used in latrine building. This means latrines are both appropriate and affordable for them. In some places, of course, this approach isn't possible. So in conflict areas (such as parts of the DRC) or places hit by a natural disaster (such as an earthquake or typhoon), the programme does send in people with water and sanitation expertise to dig wells and build latrines which is more expensive but, overall, the average cost per household for a water and sanitation programme is about £60.

> In the village of Chimbilwa in Zambia, Monica would feel ashamed when friends discovered her crouching in the bush, going to the toilet. And Monica says there was a lot of sickness before the village started building toilets. "I used to be sick for up to two weeks in a month, and sometimes, the diarrhoea was so bad that my family had to borrow an ox cart to take me to hospital. They had to sell some of our chickens to pay for medicines"

### **Easter Baking!**

I have always been fascinated with the science of baking and love to see my mixture being transformed into a perfectly risen cake for everyone to enjoy! This process reminds me of Jesus, who is also risen, for everyone to enjoy - "eternal life".

These moist and light Chocolate Muffins are an indulgent treat for Easter and ideal to bring on a picnic, thats if the weather holds up! They are also delicious as a Sunday dessert- just warm them up (very gently) in the microwave and serve with ice cream and lots of the warmed chocolate ganache!

### **Chocolate Muffins with chocolate ganache**

Makes: 12

250g plain flour; 200g caster sugar

125g chocolate chips; 45g cocoa powder

1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

2 eggs; 200g plain yoghurt

120ml milk; 120ml vegetable oil

40g chocolate chips



- 1 Preheat oven to 200 C / Gas 6. Line a muffin tray with paper cases.
- 2 Combine flour, caster sugar, 125g chocolate chips, cocoa powder and bicarbonate of soda in a large bowl. Whisk egg, yoghurt, milk and vegetable oil in another bowl until smooth; pour into chocolate mixture and stir until mixture is just mixed. Fill paper muffin cases 3/4 full and sprinkle with remaining chocolate chips.
- 3 Bake in preheated oven until a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean, about 20 minutes. Cool in the tray for 5 minutes before removing to cool completely on a wire cooling rack.

### For the chocolate ganache:

150ml double cream; 150g plain chocolate, broken into pieces

To make the icing: measure the cream and chocolate into a bowl and carefully melt over a pan of hot water over a low heat. Stir until glossy and fully melted, then set aside to cool and thicken up. Place in a piping back and pipe onto the muffins. (Gently warm the ganache if you wish to use it as a

chocolate sauce).

**Cooks Tip:** Decorate with chocolate shapes or try topping with chopped pistachio nuts.


