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# COLIN'S COLUMN

### <u>SURVIVING AND THRIVING IN A WORLD OF</u> <u>KNOWN UNKNOWNS</u>

For most years since 1993 the Plain English Campaign has presented the "Foot in Mouth Award" for the most "baffling comment by a public figure." It may not surprise you that the person with the most awards to date is a certain British politician by the name of Alexander Boris de Pfeffel Johnson. He is the recipient of three "Foot in Mouth Awards." His most recent accolades were both related to Brexit and came in 2016 and 2019. His 2016 utterance has certain Belfast connections: "Brexit means Brexit and we're going to make a Titanic success of it." However, his first award was in 2004 when, in an appearance on the satirical current affairs panel game "Have I Got News For You" he bamboozled fellow contestants and the audience with "I could not fail to disagree with you less."

A year before Boris' first award-winning line the

honour was bestowed on Donald Rumsfeld, the US Secretary for Defense, for a reply he gave to a journalist's question at a news briefing on 12<sup>th</sup> Feb. 2002



".....there are known knowns; there are things we know we know. We also know there are known unknowns; that is to say we know there are some things we do not know. But there are also unknown unknowns—the ones we don't know we don't know. And if one looks throughout the history of our country and other free countries, it is the latter category that tends to be the difficult ones."

He was talking about connecting the government of Iraq with the supply of weapons of mass destruction and, even though ridiculed for his turn of phrase, he was actually using scientifically respectable terminology familiar to experts at NASA. Rumsfeld

was well aware of the reaction evoked and paid wry homage to the moment when he entitled his 2011 autobiography "Known and Unknown: A Memoir".

If ever there was a time of known unknowns and unknown unknowns we are surely living through it.

That moment on 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2020 when Boris Johnston made his "stay at home" speech, inaugurating the first pandemic lockdown, is seared into our personal and collective consciousness. But do you also remember what he predicted a few days previously, on 19<sup>th</sup> March? "The UK will turn the tide of coronavirus in 12 weeks."

Politicians should know that, faced with known and unknown unknowns, any predictions will leave them hostages to fortune. With the benefit of hindsight we know very well that two years ago there were just too many unknowns. However, from the outset of the pandemic it was clear we were moving into unprecedented territory. It was difficult to avoid the "unprecedented" adjective because, however excessive its use became, it was accurate. None of us had lived through such a pandemic. Even now, as we begin to emerge from mitigations, we are well aware of the abiding impact on work patterns, social interactions, methods of communication, holiday arrangements, family celebrations and so much more besides. As the medical crisis subsides we are now contemplating a previously unexperienced lethal cocktail including Brexit, climate crisis, food security and industrial supply-chain disruptions. The implications accompanying the conflict focused on Ukraine are only exacerbating the economic ills as evidenced in huge price rises for fuel and food.

I will not dare make any detailed predictions as to how we will be faring on the global scene and in localised circumstances by the time you read this in Bridge News. Nevertheless, I can unfortunately predict with unwelcomed confidence that it will not be good. We are now bracing ourselves for economic, social and political realities that will launch us into another unprecedented sequence of interrelated demands.

For example, a few weeks ago a leading energy supplier announced a 39 per cent increase in gas prices. Northern Ireland's Consumer Council estimates that move will impact just under 190,000 customers at a cost of around £240 a year.

Statistics available for Northern Ireland from the UK's Trussell Trust (an umbrella group representing many foodbanks) draw our attention to the huge rise in food parcels distributed in our province from just over come to live among us? Is there anything else we can 37,000 in 2018/2019 to the nearly 80,000 food parcels be doing to assist our neighbours in need? distributed in the 2020/2021 season.

Whatever way we stack them up, the knowns and unknowns present us with unprecedented crises and challenges. That much we do know. However, what we have still to determine is our response. Faced as we are with so much that is distressing and perplexing, let me tentatively commend a cautious yet courageous, a dedicated and defiant stance.

In the face of inevitable evil we do not become passive or paralysed, but must be faithful. We are each made in the image of God and are made for the peace (shalom) which is God's intention for us. That peace is worth fighting for. So we continue to be faithful by following the way of Christ, and not being moulded or distorted by our response to evil.

We should not be surprised by the reality of evil and turmoil in our world – but neither should our overwhelming response be that of fear. As we celebrate Easter we claim the victory! Jesus said: "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." John 16 v.33

Moreover, our God is just and will ultimately ensure that right prevails. You will recall God's response to Cain after he had murdered his brother Abel: "The LORD said, 'What have you done? Listen! Your brother's blood cries out to me from the ground."

As those who are still free to do what is right and not just what is safe, we can respond with courage rather than cowardice. That may require us to step out of our comfort zones and raise our voices for, or reach out towards those who are the most vulnerable in our society and our world. In the immediate aftermath our governments can respond with direct support and we can answer appeals for humanitarian assistance. Have we considered what we will do if refugees have to

Faced with evil and suffering we need not fear - but we can be sad. There is no place for a false piety, no spiritual "stiff upper lip", that ignores our pain and distress. Over these last few years of pandemic restrictions our public mourning has been curtailed, but our private grief remains.

The Bible is full of laments, not least from the psalmist. For instance, read Psalm 6 and Psalm 130. Notice how the psalmist begins and ends the lament showing that we can weep and be brave at the same time.

Perhaps the most radical response as we face up to the unnerving knowns and unknowns is to pray. Prayer is part of our armour: "And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people." Ephesians 6 v.18

Whatever I know or do not know, I have never known a time of such potentially momentous, unsettling and threatening change. Could it be that we are now in that place and that moment when our unchanging God can work out His changeless purpose through us?

"But he said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.' Therefore, I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me. <sup>10</sup> That is why, for Christ's sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong." 2 Corinthians 12 v 9-10

The Queen sent her "warm good wishes" for the service and was represented by Mr. David McCorkell KStJ, Her Majesty's Lord Lieutenant for County Antrim. The guest preacher was the Most Rev. John McDowell, Church of Ireland Archbishop of Armagh and Primate to the throne on 6th February 1952, consequent on of All Ireland. # Christian Aid Week 15-21 May 2022

Our planet is changing, Weather extremes are now communities to grow drought-tolerant crops, teaches more frequent and more intense. For the first time in women like Janet how to grow food in dry seasons a generation, global poverty is rising. Covid-19, conflict and helps families to build storerooms to preserve and climate crisis are pushing more of our global food so they have the resilience to bounce back from neighbours into a struggle for survival.

In rural Zimbabwe, 70% of women rely on farming to earn a living and provide for their families. But intense droughts have left their land barren so people can't grow enough food and struggle to provide for their children. In times of drought, many families can only afford to eat one bowl of porridge a day. Women often skip meals to share with their children what little food they have. "We are at the mercy of climate change and hunger" Jessica Mwedzi.

Jessica toils on her farm, but no food can grow on her ash dry land. "One year, we had no rain. The sun burnt my crops just as they were about to bloom. It was so painful and disheartening. My children crave a good meal, but I can't provide. We often



them to bed hungry."

Jessica watches her sons and daughters play outside as the sun fades across the sky. They hold hands, dance and sing. She finds a ray of hope that she will overcome this tough time. One day, Jessica will be able to provide her children with good food, and a full life, free from hunger.

Janet, a grandmother also from Zimbabwe has experienced how drought pushed her family into desperate hunger. "One year, there was so little food. Rains had not fallen. We ate things which we wouldn't eat in normal times. I made porridge and gave it to the children, then removed a portion and put it down for the dogs. The children picked up the dogs' share because they weren't full. When I saw this, I knew the situation had become unbearable. My heart was so painful thinking that my family would die. By God's grace we did not die. We soldiered on."

With faith, hope and love for her family, Janet brought her family through this painful time with the support of Christian Aid's BRACT programme, which helps the most at-risk communities in Zimbabwe prepare for and adapt to the changing climate. Working with local partners, Christian Aid's work empowers vulnerable

future droughts. Families learn to eat more healthy, nutritious food and gain new skills for alternative sources of income when agriculture fails.

By learning how to grow drought-resistant crops Janet was able to bring her family through a painful time and turn her barren land into a garden of plenty. Now, her farm is bursting with life, and she harvests enough surplus food to share with her neighbours while also storing enough to survive future droughts.

# Prayers and Aid for Ukraine

In the Transcarpathian region people we have spent time with on our summer camps are very fearful and many have already left for other countries. They know friends and family in other parts of Ukraine caught up in the fighting. Able-bodied men including some of the students we shared with in summer camps have been called up for military service.

Pastor Atilla, who has visited here, has remained with his church and community in Fornos, although 60% of those living around him in the village have gone. For one Christian family we have been in touch with, the men of the family have had to go to other countries for work. Now the grandmother, a young mum with her baby and her sister in-law with 2 young children have sought safety in Hungary, not knowing when they might return. They deeply value our prayers.....

"Father, today we pray for the escalating situation in Ukraine. We confess that it can be difficult to know how to pray. So we start with our praise and thanks to you, who remains steadfast and faithful, all-seeing and all-knowing. We re-orientate ourselves in you, your timescales, your ways and your purpose. We remind ourselves of your love for this earth you formed and those you created in your image.

We struggle to see clearly through confusion and misinformation, yet recognise an age-old lust for power, control and violence. We pray for those already mourning, those who are fleeing homes and livelihoods, for those who are fearful and vulnerable.

We pray for intermediaries on the ground and those seeking to defend life and liberty. Blessed are the peacemakers. Amidst the political posturing and frightening military action we pray for those involved in genuine diplomatic efforts to avert further bloodshed.

We remember how Jesus resisted being co-opted into the religious and political uprisings of competing empires. We remember how He spoke to heal the sick, calm the storm and raise the dead. We too pray that the name of God would not be invoked in destructive nationalistic ways. We pray for powerful words and miraculous actions – for de-escalation, peace and justice, repentance and restoration.

Soft UKRAINE Crisis Appeal PCI Moderator Rev. Dr Bruce has launched an appeal for Ukraine. PCI has released £60,000 to be distributed equally between Christian Aid (Ireland), Tearfund, and one of its partner churches, the **Reformed Church in Hungary** 

through its relief and development wing, Hungarian Reformed Church Aid.

Hungarian Reformed Church Aid was among the first organisations to provide immediate assistance by delivering food packages to the Ukraine-Hungary border on the morning of the invasion, and has already sent more than 10 tonnes of non-perishable food across the border. They have welcomed people fleeing the war at train stations and at the border distributing food, tea and drinking water. They have also provided translation assistance and transported people to nearby shelters, or public transport hubs. In conjunction with the Hungarian Reformed Church's Bethesda Hospital, they are providing medical assistance to people arriving in Hungary and also sending medical supplies to Transcarpathia in western Ukraine.

Christian Aid (Ireland) and Tearfund are working with partners in Hungary, Moldova and Slovakia to help the huge numbers of people fleeing the war by providing food, bedding and temporary accommodation. £30 could provide essential hygiene supplies for three people for one month, £50 could provide blankets for four families, while £100 could provide emergency food for two families for one month.

Dr Bruce encourages people here to continue to pray, asking God that the conflict would not spread further, that those who have lost loved ones would be comforted, and those who find themselves without homes would be led to places of welcome and shelter. Pray for the Christian Churches in Ukraine, for their endurance, protection and faithful witness in face of this time of trial. Pray especially that a way might be found to bring a peaceful end to this needless war.

## From Ukraine to the world - The story of "How Great Thou Art"

Our Presbyterian hymnbook notes that our version of In many villages, Hine discovered that most of the "How Great Thou Art" was translated from Russian by people living in the Carpathians knew nothing of God's a missionary called Stuart Hine. But the full story is a little bit more complicated than that.

It seems that the hymn originated in south east Sweden, with a preacher called Carl Boberg when, on a warm humid day, he got caught in a thunderstorm and had to hurry for shelter. The storm was soon over and the sky cleared. That evening Boburg wrote a hymn called "O Store Gud", O Great God in English. His original lyrics referred to the storm

"When I hear the voice of thunder in the storm roaring

And the blades of lightning run out of the sky When the cold fresh winds of the rain whistle And the bow of the promise shines for my sight

*Chorus* Then the soul bursts forth into praise, O great God, O great God (Repeat)"

The Swedish hymn also contains references to "the high wonders of heaven" – the stars of the first verse we know, and to the pine forests, birds singing and the summer winds, similar to the "woods and forest glades", the "birds singing sweetly in the trees" and the "feel of the gentle breeze" from our familiar second verse.

Boburg's lyrics were set to the music of an old Swedish folk tune and sung in public for the first known occasion in a Swedish church in 1888. The words and music were published in 1891 in a Swedish hymnbook. The hymn was subsequently translated into Russian and German, and later English by an American academic, Professor E. Gustav Johnson.

Stuart Hine was a missionary to the Carpathian mountain region of Ukraine in the early 1930's. He toured the country by bicycle, with his wife Mercy, sharing the gospel and giving out Bibles. During their time in Ukraine they heard a Russian translation of Boburg's hymn and he started work to rewrite and adapt it.



In many villages, Hine discovered that most of the people living in the Carpathians knew nothing of God's gift of grace. He did however discover one Bible, in the home of a man called Dimitri and his wife, possibly called Lyudmila. It had been left behind by a Russian soldier in 1915 when the army had to beat a hasty retreat. Lyudmila had taught herself how to read by reading that Bible. Hine overheard Lyudmila reading from the gospel of John about the crucifixion of Christ, to a gathering we would probably call a house church. He couldn't just barge in so he stayed outside and listened to their praise. Hine wrote down the phrases he heard the worshippers use, and it seems this became the third verse that we know today: "And when I think that God, His Son not sparing, Sent Him to die, I scarce can take it in."

These were terrible times in the Ukraine. The forced collectivisation of the farms by the Bolsheviks and Stalin's persecutions created a massive famine which killed millions. Christianity was also targeted and many churches were destroyed. The Hines' had to leave Ukraine and settled in Somerset.

After the war the Hines' ministered to some of the refugees pouring into the UK from Eastern Europe and Russia and together they published a Russian magazine called Grace and Peace, perhaps the best message for war-weary souls. In 1948 one man in a refugee camp told them how he had been separated from his wife near the end of the war, and had not seen her since. He desperately wanted to find his wife, but realised he would probably never see her on earth again. He found comfort in the thought that they would meet in heaven, and share eternal life there. These words became the basis of the fourth verse "When Christ shall come with shout of acclamation and take me home, what joy shall fill my heart. Then shall I bow in humble adoration and there proclaim, My God How Great Thou Art!"

What an amazing story – a Swedish preacher caught in a thunderstorm, a Russian soldier fleeing for his life, a Ukrainian woman learning how to read from a forgotten Bible, a group of persecuted Christians worshipping at home, a lonely refugee and a missionary. Not the big names of the history of that period, just the largely unknown people, seemingly unimportant, trying to do what was best in their different, often very difficult, circumstances. But all connected to create one of the world's greatest hymns. Maybe there's a lesson for us all in that.

In these we were reminded that our parents hold the first responsibility for the spiritual growth and nurture of their children, and our role for the short time we have on a Sunday morning is to give parents support in this task. Support for parents is something we hope to develop over the coming months as we continue to encourage our First Larne kids to learn about Jesus' love for them.

### **Skewered lamb sharing plate**

4 lean Northern Ireland Farm Quality Assured lamb leg steaks, or lamb rump steaks cut into thick strips

### For the marinade

The juice of ½ lemon 2 teaspoons olive oil 1 tablespoon honey 1 teaspoon ground coriander 1 teaspoon ground cumin A tiny pinch of chilli flakes 2 garlic cloves, crushed To serve 250g pack halloumi cheese 1 teaspoon olive oil 100g red pepper humous 4 small soft wholemeal pitta breads 1/2 cucumber, cut into sticks 150g cherry tomatoes, halved 60g black olives, pitted 60g radishes, trimmed and sliced The leaves of a little gem lettuce



1 To make the marinade, simply combine the marinate ingredients in a bowl before adding the strips of lamb, mix well ensuring all of the meat is coated. Cover the bowl with cling film and refrigerate for at least 1 hour or overnight if you have time.

2 Heat a char-grill over a moderately high heat. Thread the lamb strips onto skewers and grill for 2 - 3 minutes on both sides.
3 Cut the halloumi into 8 slices, brush with a little olive oil and grill quickly on both sides for 2 minutes until lightly browned.
4 Arrange the grilled lamb and halloumi onto a serving platter along with the humous, warm pitta breads, tomatoes, olives, radishes and lettuce leaves before serving.


### First Larne Sunday School Mystery.....

While clearing out the attic of an old barn, several First Larne Sunday School prizes were discovered hiding in a barrel. The book "Salvation Sought, Found and Enjoyed" had an inscription to Jane Getty. But this may indicate a sad tale as it reads …"to Jane Getty who died 5 December 1874 for repeating quarter lessons 27 Sept". The inscription is dated 27<sup>th</sup> Decem 1874. So did this young girl die tragically early? Could she have been connected to the Getty Mission on Mission Lane (behind Dormans)? In those days the Sunday School served many outside First Larne church so the girls may not have been members of our congregation.

The book entitled "The Life of Our Lord" is inscribed as being awarded to Maggie Cuthbert. Can you tell us more about her? One of our older members remembers Maggie living in a cottage beside the water pump at the foot of Casements Brae. Comments please to the church office!
